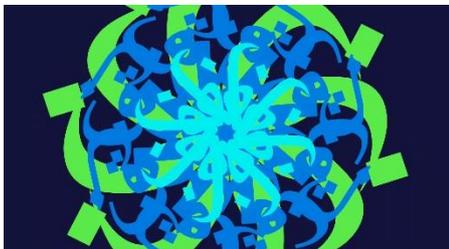

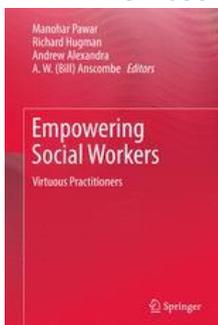

NVivo is computer software package designed for researchers analysing very rich text-based and/or multimedia information, (including interviews, open-ended survey responses, articles, social media and web content).

Topics covered over the two days include analysing text based data, using multimedia sources of data, queries, visualisations, exploring and reporting your data. The workshop is aimed to provide the novice with essential skills in using NVivo software for research purposes

Topics that are covered include uses of surveys, constructing survey questions that are clear and unbiased, the need to match attitudinal or behavioral data collection with the purpose of the survey, and combining objective and open-ended questioning in order to enhance the usability of results.

The two-day course will focus on: types of questions, types of response categories, open versus closed ended questions, questionnaire layout and order of questions and questioning, common mistakes, pilot testing and specific issues such as "The importance of Cover Design." The workshop includes practice designing the layout of surveys and practice critiquing and writing questions and responses.

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- **New Human Research Ethics Application (HREA)**

The **National Ethics Application Form (NEAF)** has recently been replaced with the Human Research Ethics Application (HREA) Form, and can be accessed via <https://hrea.gov.au/>. Both forms are currently available on the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) website. The NEAF will be decommissioned on 30 June 2017.

Researchers have some flexibility in choosing when to move to the new HREA Form as the Charles Sturt University Human Research Ethics Committee and Faculty Human Ethics Committees will continue to accept the NEAF up to and including the April 2017 meetings.

HREA Form resources such as the 'Getting Started Guide' and 'How to Guide' are available on the HREA website.

- **Research Outputs collection (ROC) – Assessment of 2016 Outputs**

The **Research Outputs Collection (ROC)** is the annual reporting of both traditional and non-traditional research outputs generated by CSU staff and students, and is essential to inform our research planning and support mechanisms. In March, all relevant staff will receive an individual email from the Research Office containing a list of their 2016 publications recorded in the MyResearch database. This list will need to be checked and any missing publications entered.

Publications must be entered by **Monday the 3rd April** to allow sufficient time for processing and verification of eligibility.
